# UOG Memories: A Connection Between (Educational) Psychology and Poetry Yukiko Inoue-Smith, PhD Professor Emerita of Educational Psychology

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#### 1. Brief Personal Background Information:

I was born and grew up in Japan. After graduating from college, I came to America for graduate school, majoring in educational psychology. I remarried in 2012 and, at the same time, adopted two kittens. Since then, the *four* of us (two people and two cats) have lived happily (most of the time) in Guam. Having retired, we are now moving to the U.S. mainland.

#### 2. Brief Academic Background Information:

I joined the School of Education at the University of Guam on August 18, 1997, as Assistant Professor. I was promoted to Associate Professor in 2001, my tenure was granted in 2002, and I was promoted to Professor in 2006. And I retired on May 21, 2021, after my 24 years of service at the University. My primary teaching assignments as a faculty in the Division of Foundations and Educational Research and Human Service in the School of Education included undergraduate courses (such as Educational Psychology and Introduction to Teaching) and graduate courses (such as Research Methods, Qualitative Research, and Quantitative Research). These courses enhance pre-service and in-service teachers' knowledge and skills in teaching.

Started in August 1997 and ended in May 2021.

Informed that I was the first Japanese hired as a faculty in the School of Education.

7. Your legacies are sought to be remembered as part of the 70-year history of UOG:

I would like to be remembered for the following: My work at UOG was guided by my commitment to collaboration, and my wanting to be a valuable colleague. Problems in teaching require creative thinking, and I have tried to approach them with innovative solutions. I have always seen a "reciprocal" relationship between teaching and research. *Teaching* gives direction and purpose to research. At the same time, *research* ensures that teaching is continuously updated and improved. These approaches helped me to stay motivated and to be productive.

## 8. Special Memories of UOG – Teaching, Courses Taught, Field Trips, Field Schools, Research Projects, Conferences, Programs, Events, University Service, Community Service, Community and Regional Outreach and Engagement, Administrative Activities, Committee Activities, etc.:

Apart from education courses, I was once asked to teach *tanka* in the education graduate program as a Language and Literacy Special Topic Seminar. Students not only became knowledgeable about the historical background and concept of tanka, but also produced a collection of tanka as a final project. Their comments on the course include: "Tanka is very 'freeing' because it allows me to express my thoughts in a very creative manner"; "I find that using five lines effectively, we can create a larger picture without saying too much"; and "This class has fulfilled my expectation for helping me develop an appreciation for poetry along with a knowledge base that gives me more confidence to teach poetry in general." Comments such as these indicate that students would like to have this type of course made available more often.
